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1. INTRODUCTION

- Smart shrinking is defined by making quality of life better in the area, not growing the population;
- Our understanding of smart shrinking: how smart shrinking has been used or can be used in two study areas. One in Savonranta village in Finland and the other in Palmse village in Estonia;



The research questions for this analysis:

- 1. What is the social atmosphere in Savonranta and Palmse like?
- 2. What is the physical atmosphere in Savonranta and Palmse like?
- 3. How do they promote smart shrinking?

1.1 THEORY ACCORDING TO ARTICLES

- In Europe depopulation is seen as a process that must be handled quickly- limiting community services and infrastructure while maintaining social equity and good life. (Peters et al., 2018);
- Most important indicator of shrinkage is population loss followed by vacant residential houses and abandoned houses (Vujičić & Đukić, 2015);
- Different challenges like maintaining community services, businesses, and infrastructure are difficult when population declines, because areas get less tax money (Meijer & Syssner, 2017)






3.4 UKRANIAN REFUGEES IN SAVONRANTA


45 people from contacts in Poland live in Savonranta;



5. RECOMMENDATIONS 5.1 SAVONRANTA



Increase social media activity and marketing;



Tourism should be focused more on heritage sights;



Give the old gas station a new life once back in municipal hands.

5.2 PALMSE



Create affordable spaces for new inhabitants;



Sell the cow farm to Palms OÜ so they can expand;



Rent out the most attractive spaces of the grain factory, demolish the rest and build anew.

6. *CONCLUSIONS*

Both study areas are quite different:

Tourism in Palmse flourishes whilst Savonranta could work on their tourism sector;

Unemployment rates differ — Savonranta suffers from its location and a small job market, but Palmse has a very low unemployment rate and a good location for job reach;

But are also similar in some

Both areas are tainted with abandoned buildings that ruin the towns image;

They have a pretty tight knit communities that make living in the small town's fun and eventful.

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
